



### David Aaron



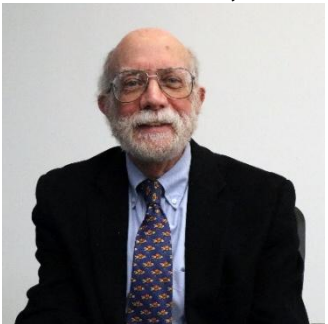
David Aaron began his career as a Foreign Service Officer, and served on the National Security Council staff. He was a task force leader on the Church Committee. From 1977-1981, Aaron was Deputy National Security Adviser. In 1993, he became United States Permanent Representative to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in Paris and in 1996 he was assigned the additional job of White House Special Envoy for Cryptography. He also served as the Under Secretary of Commerce for US International Trade Commission.

### Jack Devine



Jack Devine is a 32-year veteran of the CIA, where he served as both acting director and associate director of the CIA's operations outside the U.S., as well as chief of the Latin American Division, the head of CIA's Counternarcotics Center, and the head CIA's Afghan Task Force. He was awarded the CIA's Meritorious Officer Award and is a recipient of the Agency's Distinguished Intelligence Medal. Mr. Devine is founder and chairman of the Arkin Group, a boutique strategic intelligence firm. He is the author of *Spymaster's Prism: The Fight Against Russian Aggression*, and *Good Hunting: An American Spymaster's Story*.

### Mark Lowenthal, Ph.D.



Dr. Mark Lowenthal chairs the Education Committee at the Council on Intelligence Issues. His government service includes deputy assistant for the U.S. Department of State Bureau of Intelligence and Research (INR); staff director of the House Intelligence Committee; and assistant deputy director of Central Intelligence (DCI) for Analysis and Production.. He has taught at Columbia University and Sciences Po (Paris) and is currently on the faculty at Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). Dr. Lowenthal is the author of the standard textbook on intelligence, *Intelligence: From Secrets to Power* (9<sup>th</sup> edition, Sage CQ) and of the forthcoming history of U.S. intelligence, *Vigilance Is Not Enough* (Yale, May 2025).



### James Taylor



James Taylor had a 25-year career with the U.S. Government, beginning as a Foreign Service Officer. He spent six years with the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), and fifteen years with the Central Intelligence Agency as Comptroller, Associate Deputy Director for Science and Technology, Inspector General, and Executive Director. He is a recipient of the Central Intelligence Agency's Distinguished Intelligence Medal.

Gregory Treverton served on the staffs of the Church Committee and National Security Council. On the National Intelligence Council he served as vice chair and chair. He has taught at Harvard University, Columbia University, and RAND Corp. In addition, Treverton, has served as a senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR), and deputy director of the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London. He is currently chair of the Global TechnoPolitics Forum and senior advisor to the Transnational Threats Project at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). Treverton is also a professor of the practice of International Relations and Spatial Sciences at the University of Southern California. His latest books are *Telling Truth to Power: A History of the National Intelligence Council*, (edited, with Robert Hutchings), Oxford University Press, 2019; and *National Intelligence and Science: Beyond the Great Divide in Analysis and Policy*, (with Wilhelm Agrell), Oxford University Press, 2015.
